Nicholas started as the Cued Speech Development and Fundraising Officer in September 2010. He initially joined the Association as a member 10 years ago and has also been a children's course tutor at the Summer School since 2008.

Until recently he was living and working in France and has been a teacher of English as a Foreign Language (EFL) for 20 years including 10 years of running his own language centre in Nantes and teaching at university. This experience helped him develop some of the skills for development and fundraising including product development, work plans, promoting, marketing literature and support, accounting and - he tells us - being nice to people!

Nicholas has a son and daughter and despite his daughter's profound deafness, both are bilingual, something he credits to the 'magic' of Cued Speech at home and LPC - its French equivalent - at school. His daughter's primary classes were bilingual sign/spoken French, so she is trilingual. His wife Tracey has Level 2 Certificate in Cued Speech Proficiency and has used

Cued Speech professionally both in France and England; and in both languages. She is currently delivering Cued Speech training locally in Berkshire. At home the whole family cues in English while the children continue to use French (particularly when they want to *try* and out-smart mum and dad).

Nicholas will work largely from home in Berkshire with regular visits to the Association office in Devon. Executive Director, Anne Worsfold said: 'I know that with Nicholas' business and language teaching experience combined with his personal use of Cued Speech he is the very best person for the job. We are very grateful to the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation for their advice and help and especially for their funding of Nicholas' salary for the next 18 months.'

Summer School

Parents of deaf children travelled from all around the UK - and some from as far as Poland, the Philippines and France - to learn Cued Speech at our Exeter-based Summer School in August. Also attending were professionals such as Teachers of the Deaf. The parents and professionals learnt a life-changing skill which will allow deaf children to understand and use English and the children had a wonderful time; the little ones in the crèche and the older ones on their own course.



This year's children's course was especially impressive with some giant leaps in understanding taking place during the week. The deaf and hearing children who attended used three different languages (English and French – both cued and spoken - and British Sign Language). The children were astonished to see the three languages in action side by side as staff catered for all language needs.



There were some wonderful personal success stories during the five-day Summer School with some parents quickly learning to communicate with their children. Comments included:

Dynamic Learning Environment - Cuedle

Cued Speech learners and users now have a brand new on-line resource called a Dynamic Learning Environment (DLE). Aply named Cuedle, our site can be used to post and read comments, to ask questions and share ideas on the general forum, and to access new and evolving learning tools.

Registering and using the site is easy:

1. Log on to the website: www.cuedle.co.uk.
2. Go to top right hand corner of the page that opens and click on the 'Log In' Box.
3. This will take you to a new page. You will find a list of instructions to follow under the heading 'Is this your first time here?' Click on either 'New Account' (under point Number 1) or go to the bottom and click 'Create New Account' - either option will take you to the next page.
4. Now fill in your details which will involve creating your own password and username.
5. You will then receive an email immediately to your email address from Andy Houghton, the volunteer who

set up Cuedle for us, to confirm that your account is ready to use.

6. To start communicating on Cuedle just log in and go to the Main Menu (front page) and click on the 'GENERAL FORUM', or on 'SAY HELLO' on live chat (if anyone else is online). Both are listed on the left side of the page under Main Menu.

7. To reply to someone else's topic in the General Forum section, click on their discussion under the column 'started by' and then a new page will come up. Click on the person again, then on 'send message'. Type in the area provided and send. Teachers and admin. staff will be able to add new topics for discussion - so keep watching out for new postings.

Ways in which Cued Speech is used

Cued Speech can be used in different ways. Probably the most common has been to give whole language access to a deaf child in a hearing home - often from babyhood. It can also be introduced at school age and Wendy, a Hearing Support Assistant in a mainstream school, wrote to tell us how useful she has found it:

'I have used Cued Speech for 2½ years with a profoundly deaf boy (with hearing aids, not implanted), in a mainstream school.

'We use Cued Speech mostly as a literacy tool, helping with technical words and other new vocabulary. Cued Speech has been invaluable in helping him to understand the use of phonics. He now has a good understanding of how words can be worked out and does very well with his spelling of words. I use it throughout the day alongside BSL. When introducing new vocabulary, Cued Speech helps with the pronunciation, and then we link the word with a sign for future use. He understands that BSL and Cued Speech are separate and doesn't mix them up.

'In class we regularly use a phonics computer programme, which is normally totally inaccessible to a

deaf child. Our pupil can fully access this programme because of the use of Cued Speech. I sit at the front and cue to him everything that is said and he is fully included. It includes individual sounds, blending, segmenting words and reading sentences.

'I always like to get him to cue while reading as this helps him to work out words and helps with clarity of his speech. I would like to improve my level of cueing; this is because I can see that he would benefit from being offered more through cueing - he would have greater access to the English language leading to a higher level of knowledge generally.

'He did very well in his Year Two SAT tests:

Writing	2A
Reading	2A
Maths	2B

Children of his age are expected to achieve level 2B; so 2A is slightly above average. The results show how well he is progressing through his mainstream education. His teacher said that he has good communication skills, he makes himself understood, and concentrates well on the teacher and myself.'

Cued Speech - complete spoken language through vision

Cued Speech is a simple sound-based system which uses eight handshapes in four positions near the mouth together with the lip patterns of normal speech to make spoken language fully accessible to deaf and hearing-impaired babies, children and adults.
